Celebrating Excellence and Innovation at CCMS: December Updates from the President

As we approach the end of the year, it's a time to reflect, celebrate achievements, and look forward to the future. At the Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science (CCMS), we are proud to announce that our December 2024 Graduation Ceremony will take place on Friday, December 13th, at 2:00 PM at the Sharonville Convention Center in Sharonville, Ohio. This ceremony marks the culmination of hard work and dedication for 52 graduates from eight different states. The commencement address will be given by Mr. George Horne, II, Past President and Board Member of the Ohio Board of Embalmers and Funeral Directors.

These graduates have demonstrated excellence, as reflected in their first-time pass rates on the National Board Examination (NBE). This graduating class achieved a first-time pass rate of 85% for both Arts and Science, significantly outperforming the national averages of 78% for Arts and 67% for Science. This success is a testament to our unwavering commitment to delivering the American Board of Funeral Service Education (ABFSE) curriculum with precision and focus. The CCMS NBE first time pass rate for 2023 was 86% for the Arts and 77% for Science.

As I often say, "If a graduate can't pass the NBE, they are blocked from entering our profession, no matter how competent." At CCMS, we take this challenge seriously. Since my tenure began in 2016, when the first-time pass rate for Science was only at 57%, our faculty and staff have worked tirelessly to reach the incredible results we see today. Their dedication to our students' success deserves recognition and gratitude.

The Educational Cremation Center: A National Leader in Innovation

Another source of pride for CCMS is the fully operational Educational Cremation Center (ECC). As the only mortuary college in the nation to offer hands-on cremation education, CCMS continues to set itself apart. Students not only receive instruction but actively participate in the cremation process, including handling and processing remains.

The ECC features state-of-the-art equipment, such as an FT III cremator, auto loader, processor, and a PET 400 for hands-on instruction in Alkaline Hydrolysis (AH). This greener method of disposition, with only 10% of the carbon footprint of traditional cremation, is also a cornerstone of our expanding pet loss program. Funeral homes can now utilize our facilities for cremations, including the use of our witness room and slumber bed, providing families the opportunity to view their loved one, have a moment to say good-bye, and participate in the cremation process.

We invite local funeral homes to schedule cremations, alkaline hydrolysis services, or to utilize our witness room by calling 513.761.3773.

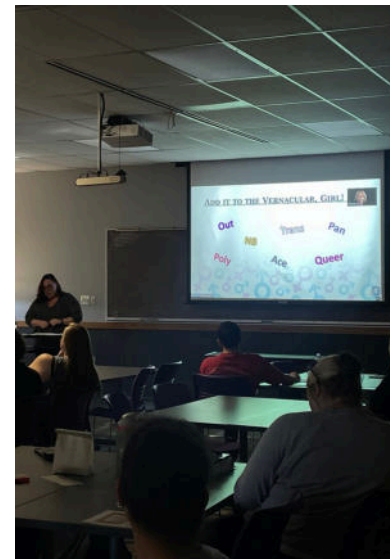
Academics at CCMs

CCMS held its first summer car show to raise funds to help benefit student resources. We were small but mighty as we dealt with a cloudy day! Lots of fun to be had by all!





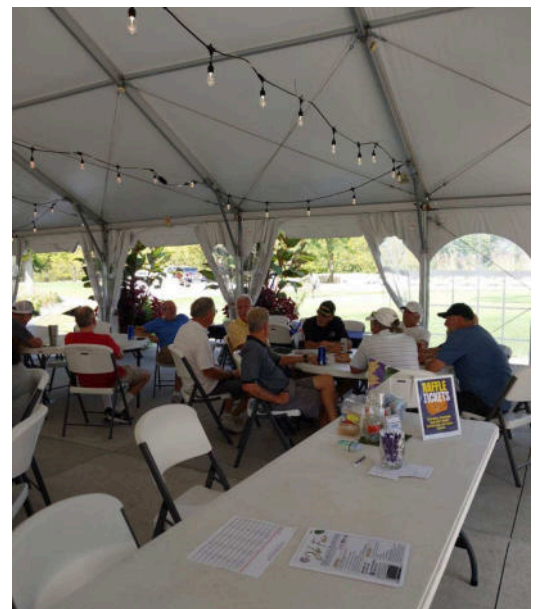

He also recently attended a grief conference in Canada and has shared his experiences below.

"Recently, I had the unique opportunity to attend a grief conference hosted by Julien's House in Windsor, Canada, with keynote speaker Dr. Alan Wolfelt. Being one of the few from funeral industry, it was an insightful experience for anyone dedicated to understanding and supporting those in grief. Dr. Wolfelt's Companioning model, which encourages walking beside grieving individuals rather than attempting to "fix" them, offered a powerful shift in perspective on how we approach grief support. This model highlights the importance of patience, empathy, and authentic presence, reframing grief as a journey rather than a problem to be solved.

Throughout the conference, Dr. Wolfelt shared his expertise on grief and bereavement, challenging attendees to reconsider traditional approaches to

grief care. His sessions encouraged a focus on deep, genuine connections with those who are mourning, and he emphasized that healing comes not from quick fixes but from compassionate, ongoing support. This message resonates strongly within the funeral service field, where the opportunity to make a meaningful difference in someone's life is both a privilege and a responsibility.

Julien's House provided a welcoming environment for those who attended, creating a sense of community among professionals from various backgrounds who share a commitment to supporting individuals through loss. The chance to learn from Dr. Wolfelt, a leading figure in grief counseling, was invaluable, offering practical tools and insights that will enhance my ability to provide empathetic and compassionate care.

For anyone in the funeral industry or in roles involving grief support, this conference was a reminder of the power of compassionate presence. Attending an event with Dr. Wolfelt offers an opportunity to grow in understanding and to reaffirm one's commitment to serving those in mourning. If you ever have the opportunity to experience Dr. Wolfelt's teachings in person, it is a journey worth taking – a truly transformative experience that deepens your perspective on the essential, human role we play in the lives of others."

It is with heavy hearts that we announce the passing of CCMS Board of Trustees member James Patrick Flynn, a beloved husband, father, and entrepreneur, who left this world peacefully on October 20, 2024, at the age of 68. Jim is survived by his loving wife Christy, his children Paul and Mariana, his stepchildren David (Nina) and Lisa (Andrew), and his grandchildren Marley, Frankie, Mia and Sophia. He is the son of the late Arthur J. Flynn and Mary Ann (nee Kipp) Flynn-Sidenstick, sibling of Tom (Janette) and Paula Flynn Mertes and the late Janet Smith (Flynn).

Jim was a true Renaissance man of remarkable spirit and boundless love. He dedicated his life to building not only a successful career but also a warm and loving family. As the founder of thriving businesses, he inspired many with his passion for innovation and his unwavering belief in the power of hard work. His entrepreneurial journey was marked by integrity and kindness, traits that endeared him to colleagues and competitors alike.

Proudly born and raised in Cincinnati, Jim had deep roots in his community that extended further over the years. He attended Purcell for high school and forged lifelong friendships through the drama club, Queen's Men, that he undeniably held close to his heart. He always made time to show each of his friends how much they meant to him in so many unique ways. He also achieved his masters in economics at the University of Cincinnati. Jim was always the first to offer a lending hand to anyone in need.
